

MESSAGE FROM FLOYD LARSEN CEO CURE CANCER AUSTRALIA

For every business, the end of the fiscal year is an ideal opportunity to review its recent successes and changes, and Cure Cancer Australia is no different.

Since coming on board as CEO of Cure Cancer Australia two years ago, I have seen the business grow and evolve in a myriad of ways. 2016 saw us steer the organisation in a new direction, applying successfully to the Australian Charities and Not-for-Profits Commission to change our financial reporting from calendar to fiscal year. Consequently, this report is prepared for the eighteen-month period from 1st Jan 2016 – 30th June 2017.

In this time, the company's mode of operations has completely transformed. We have embraced cloud-based automation tools in order to optimise operations, agility and cost efficiencies, which have not only reinforced the structure of the business, but also supported our ongoing growth opportunities, allowing us to focus on what matters most.

My primary commitment has always been to ensure Cure Cancer Australia is recognised as Australia's principal funder of early-career researchers working across all areas of cancer research and all cancer types, including rare cancers. Thanks to the collaborative effort of all our supporters and our wonderful Principal Supporter, the Can Too Foundation, we are edging ever closer to achieving this.

We have put in place multiple sustainable, predictable revenue streams with scalable systems and processes, such as our nationwide initiative BARBECURE. Awareness of our organisation continues to grow, and is set to increase exponentially thanks to our selection as charity of choice for Sydney Airport's highly contested Community Christmas Giving Appeal 2017.

I am delighted to be able to say that so far, Cure Cancer Australia has funded 316 individual scientists and 483 research projects, investing



close to \$27.5 million in grants to support the brightest innovators in cancer research at a time in their careers when it matters most. In today's research environment, funding is tight, and researchers almost always need to have a proven track record of results before they can be considered, meaning very few grants are available to emerging scientists. It is for this reason that we choose to exclusively fund early-career researchers; recognising and supporting the most promising research projects from the most forward-thinking minds.

Over the last ten years our research alumni have attracted on average an additional \$45 of future research funding for every dollar we have invested in them. Many Cure Cancer Australia researchers who received our funding early in their careers are now amongst Australia and the world's most prominent cancer researchers.

This year marked 50 years of Cure Cancer Australia's unwavering commitment to funding crucial cancer research from Australia's most innovative minds. The current fiscal year also signified our transition into a new era, which saw us move into our beautiful new offices on 422 Kent Street and launch our brand-new website – a fantastic resource designed to ensure our supporters can keep up to date with our latest news, events and researcher updates, and find out about all the different ways they can support early-career cancer researchers.

None of these achievements would have been possible without the hard work of our incredibly talented and dedicated team, and of course, you, our supporters. Your commitment to our cause is a huge source of inspiration, and I want to take this opportunity to thank each and every one of you. Please read on as we look back at some of our highlights of the past 18 months.

Cure Cancer Australia's history dates back to 1967 when the Jenny Trust was launched, joining forces with the Leo Trust in 1985 to form the Leo & Jenny Leukemia and Cancer Foundation. The trusts were established by two families in honour of loved ones they had lost to leukemia. In 2002, the foundation officially became Cure Cancer Australia Foundation.

Under every guise we've had, our founding principle has always been the same: To fund the best and brightest minds in cancer research in the hope that we can one day cure cancer for good. By backing innovative research ideas across all cancer types and all areas of cancer research, we believe we have the best chance of success.

In March of this year, we celebrated our 50th birthday with an intimate cocktail event at Government House, attended by our patron; His Excellency General The Honourable David Hurley AC DSC (Ret'd) Governor of New South Wales. We continued to celebrate our milestone birthday at our 50th Birthday Researcher Symposium and Researcher Showcase, held in May of this year. The annual event is one of the most important on the Cure Cancer Australia calendar, and this year was more significant than ever.

The event saw current researchers and past alumni come together over two days from across the country to share their work, and provided an opportunity for our partners, sponsors and supporters to celebrate our researchers, whilst gaining invaluable insight into their research







Our stellar showcase panel was made up of Professor Martin Tattersall AO, Professor Pamela Russell AM, Professor Roger Reddel, Professor Carolyn Mountford and Professor Robyn Ward AM. 2017 Australian of the Year, Professor Alan MacKay-Sim also delivered a key note address and participated as part of our alumni panel. BARBECURE

Cure Cancer Australia nationwide campaign BARBECURE was developed in 2016. Our new signature fundraising initiative was developed so that it could be easily replicated on any scale by anyone, anywhere. BARBECURE's simplicity, scalability and adaptability is at the forefront of our long-term growth strategy. Since inception, BARBECURE has grown to become a nationally executable campaign, encouraging Australians everywhere to play a part in finding a cure for cancer simply by turning their Aussie barbecues into BARBECUREs. A BARBECURE can be anything from a backyard, beach, corporate, community or black-tie event, with the goal being to create a new tradition marked on every Australian's calendar: The Summer of BARBECUREs.

Featuring Australian icon Paul Hogan AM as its lead ambassador, the campaign was officially launched in November 2016 with a bipartisan BARBECURE at Parliament House, Canberra, attended by Australian politicians from all sides of politics.

BARBE<u>CURE</u> has since become one of Cure Cancer Australia's most successful national awareness initiatives, raising over \$208,000 in its first year. We are excited to continue and expand on this success for our summer 2017/2018 rollout, and are delighted to have the initiative continue to be supported by lead celebrity ambassador Paul Hogan, along with our patron, The Honourable David Hurley.

Cure Cancer Australia's ongoing objective is to increase revenue from individuals, corporates and community groups across Australia. We do this via the continual development of annual campaigns, events and fundraising products, with an emphasis on brand awareness and the strengthening of relationships with partners, stakeholders, donors and grant recipients.

As a Not-for-Profit organisation there are many discounts available, and where possible we try to limit the cash costs of our activities by seeking donations in-kind from service providers. This means that a large proportion of our non-fundraising costs are donations in-kind (i.e. pro bono support).

Cure Cancer Australia is working to continuously reduce traditional operational costs, in parallel with investing in new technology platforms and systems to facilitate and support growth. We have a donor-centric culture and business-wide technology focus, therefore investment in digital, automated reporting and state-of-the-art metrics are key to our success. These systems enable us to provide our valued donors with more timely and relevant information. During 2016/17 we have transitioned IT operations to the cloud and invested in automated marketing platform, Pardot. This forms part of our focus on improving our donors' overall experience.

PARTNERS AND SUPPORTERS

Our Principal Supporter: The Can Too Foundation

For 12 years, Can Too and Cure Cancer Australia have had an evolving and impactful partnership, delivering Can Too supported grants to 143 cancer researchers since 2005. Back in 2005 Julie White, the Head of the Macquarie Group Foundation, believed in Annie Crawford and her idea of matching fitness incentives with fundraising. Cure Cancer Australia were the third piece of the puzzle and were instrumental in the initial launch phase of Can Too, providing opportunities to invest in Australia's brightest early-career cancer researchers.

The first Can Too program trained 54 people who ran the 10km, 21km or 42km events at the Blackmores Sydney Running Festival. Annie, Chair and Founder of Can Too, had hoped to raise \$50,000 for Cure Cancer Australia, but through the success of the program the fundraising efforts more than doubled, with participants raising an incredible \$105,000!

Can Too has continued to flourish over the years, raising over \$18.5 million to date. Now the Can Too Foundation, the organisation is an independent Health Promotion Foundation that continues to deliver supportive training programs to fundraise for cancer research.



Can Too grants have supported early-career cancer researchers across all cancer types with major beneficiary Cure Cancer Australia.

Looking ahead to the future, the Can Too Foundation is on the road to raising \$20 million by mid-2018 for the research, prevention, care and control of cancer. The fundraising is a by-product of the unique Can Too culture that provides a supportive and empowering community to achieve personal health, wellbeing and altruistic goals.
