Since 1967, Cure Cancer has grown from two inspirational family run charities to a national foundation that has funded more than 470 research projects across all cancer types - including rare cancers, and all areas of cancer research. Through the generous support of the community, our Researcher Alumni have achieved significant advances in the prevention, detection and treatment of many cancers.

Saving lives through technology

In the 1980's Carolyn was working on a radical new form of cancer detection widely regarded as 'crazy'. With little chance of funding from elsewhere, Cure Cancer supported her work that led to the development of magnetic resonance spectroscopy (MRS) with a series of four crucial research grants in 1988, 1992, 1993 and 1995.

MRS is highly effective in the detection of thyroid, breast, cervical and ovarian cancers and has since helped thousands of people. This incredible technology has now been patented by the Australian government to assist in the detection of depression and post-traumatic stress disorder. Carolyn is CEO and Director of Research at the Translational Research Institute in Queensland.

IMPROVING CANCER PATIENT CARE

Professor Martin Tattersall AO has had a long and distinguished career as an oncologist.

Widely respected in Australia and internationally for his contribution to patient care and to research, Martin has led the way in educating patients about their cancer and their prognosis.

Martin has been a Cure Cancer grant recipient three times. He received grants in 1989, 1990 and 1992. For 15 years, Martin's passion has been to improve the communication between cancer patients and their doctors. Martin is contributing to advances in this field through his research and as a Director of the Centre for Medical Psychology and Evidence-based Decision-making (CeMPED) at the University of Sydney.

Martin has always believed that it is the bright ideas that early-career researchers have in their 20's and 30's that lead to Nobel prizes in their 50's and 60's. He is thrilled with the success of Cure Cancer's Researcher Alumni, many of whom have attracted further funding worth thousands more than their initial grants.

Martin encourages people to consider leaving a gift in their Will to ensure that Cure Cancer can continue to focus on funding more brilliant earlycareer researchers, funded purely on the basis of excellence.

RESEARCH SAVES PRECIOUS LIVES

Professor Tattersall AO has saved many lives, including Lisa Greissl's.

"When I was diagnosed with cancer, it was malignant and aggressive. I had recently given birth to my second daughter, Lara. After my diagnosis, I was referred to Professor Tattersall for chemotherapy.

Professor Tattersall explained his understanding of my situation, and he prescribed two types of medication for my treatment. After 3 rounds of intense chemotherapy, when it came to surgery the tumour was dead!

Professor Tattersall's approach had worked wonders. He has not only saved my life but he has touched me and my family's heart with his care and compassion. We need more Professor Tattersalls!"

Cancer survival rates have dramatically improved.

Professor Tattersall AO was Chair of the Cure Cancer Medical Grants Advisory Committee when development work was funded for the first bone marrow transplants in Australia. This early research led to drastically improved outcomes for patients with many cancers. Other research funded by Cure Cancer in the 1980's has led to the survival rate of childhood leukaemia going from nil to approximately 80%^{*}.

Despite this amazing progress, 117 people still die from cancer every day^{*}. Only research can cure cancer. Urgent continued investment in cancer research is the only way we can change this.

Arthur was passionate about funding research and the work of Cure Cancer. His incredible legacy has made an enormous impact on the researchers his bequest has been able to fund.

Thanks to special people like Arthur Byrne and all those who have left us a bequest, the vital work of Cure Cancer Australia can continue. "We'll win, but we need your support. Over forty years ago, when I helped to set up the organisation that would eventually become Cure Cancer, I was motivated mainly by the fate of my late brother Leo, who had leukaemia.

If we could support the country's most gifted researchers in finding a cure for this disease, and get other committed people involved, we could ensure fewer and fewer families suffered the anguish of losing relatives to cancer.

HOW TO LEAVE A GIFT TO CURE CANCER IN YOUR WILL

If you have not already made a Will, we have outlined below some important information to consider.

Once you have made a Will and ensured that your family and loved ones have been taken care of, there are four ways you may choose to make a bequest:

1. Residual Bequest

You may choose to give a portion of, or the balance remaining of your Estate. Such a gift is commonly stated as a percentage of the residue.

2. General or Pecuniary Bequest

You may choose to provide a gift of a fixed amount of money. Inflation proofing a cash legacy ensures the actual value doesn't diminish over time.

3. Asset Bequest

You may choose to provide a gift of specific items like property, shares, bonds, art and jewellery etc.

4. Percentage Bequest

A percentage of the overall value of your Estate which allows for growth or depletion of the value of your Estate.

SUGGESTED WORDING FOR YOUR WILL

If you would like to leave a gift to Cure Cancer in your Will, it is important to have the correct wording to ensure that your wishes are carried out correctly.

While we have provided some suggested wording, we strongly recommend that you consult your Solicitor, State or Public Trustee or Trustee Company for further assistance.

Donations of \$2 or more are tax deductible.

If you wish to leave a proportion of your Estate to Cure Cancer in the form of a Residuary Gift:

1.2 WHICH I DIRECT be paid free of all duties of whatever kind and I express the wish, but without imposing any trust or other obligation at law or in equity, that such sum be used to support cancer research in such manner as the Board of Directors may determine and I direct that the receipt of the Chief Executive Officer or other authorised officer of Cure Cancer shall be sufficient discharge to my trustees. Should this legacy fail for any reason whatsoever then the amount of this legacy will form part of my Estate.' THINGS TO CONSIDER WHEN MAKING YOUR WILL

We know that making a Will can be rather daunting so we are here to help as much as we can. The following points outline some of the things you need to think about before creating this important document:

1. What assets and debts do you have?

It can be a good idea to make a list of all your assets and their value. Remember to include things like superannuation and life insurance. Then jot down everything you owe or are owed, including mortgages, loans, bills etc. Remember that tax may be payable on some assets such as investment properties, so this should be included in your calculations. Your Estate is what is left of your assets after all your debts have been paid.

2. Who would you like to benefit and how?

Make a list of the people and organisations you would like to benefit from your Will and think about how you would like to divide your Estate between them. Gifts of property or cash made in your Will are known as a bequest. Remember to consider past and present dependents and other members of your household such as:

- · Your spouse or de facto partner
- Your children
- Your former spouse
- Any other dependents or people with whom you are living in a close personal relationship.

3. Who will be your Executor?

The Executor or Executors carry out the wishes expressed in your Will. You will need to appoint one or more as part of your Will.

QUESTIONS TO ASK YOUR SOLICITOR

It may be helpful to discuss the following points when meeting with a solicitor about your Will:

1. Have you adequately provided for close relatives and dependents?

Failure to adequately provide for those people for whom you should provide may mean that your Will can be challenged. Your solicitor will be able to advise you on this issue.

2. Do you need to appoint a Guardian for any dependents?

If you have dependent children, consider whether a Guardian needs to be appointed for their care, and who the best person for this might be.

3. Do you have property that will automatically pass to a partner?

If you hold property in common or jointly, you may wish to bring this to the attention of your solicitor.

4. Do you hold property in trust for someone else?

Ask your solicitor whether special provision needs to be made in your Will for this.

Keep it safe and up to date

Your Will is an important document. Most people like to keep the original with their solicitor or legal advisor and store an additional copy in a safe place, but do be sure to inform your Executor where the original document can be found. Your Will should be reviewed every seven years or after any major changes in your life, such as getting married or divorced, buying a property or having a child.

Any changes must be made by 'codicil' or by making a new Will otherwise your changes will have no legal effect and could invalidate the whole of your existing Will.
